About the Seal

The University seal is comprised of the following carefully sculptured symbols: a palmetto tree, a miniature building and a torch. The palmetto tree stands in the center of the seal and represents the official tree of South Carolina. At the base of the tree, on the left, is a miniature Morrill Hall symbolizing education and history. Morrill Hall, one of the first buildings constructed on the campus was named in recognition of the Morrill Act which established land-grant colleges in the United States. South Carolina State University is a member of the land-grant system. On the right side of the tree is a torch which connotes a deep devotion to truth. "Scientia, Officium, Honos," meaning Knowledge, Duty, Honor. The seal is used on all official documents of the University.

The seal was designed for the Inauguration of Dr. M. Maceo Nance, Jr., fifth President of South Carolina State in 1968 by Dr. Leo F. Twiggs, former Professor of Art at the institution.

OUTSTANDING ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND ACHIEVEMENTS AWARD Ms. Patrena Rice, '71

Patrena Rice grew up in Hemingway, South Carolina, and graduated from South Carolina State College (now a university) in 1971 with a bachelor's degree in mathematics. She pledged Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated, and was pleased to have a work-study opportunity at the well-known Washington Dining Hall.

Before graduating, Patrena was recruited by the C & P Telephone Company of Virginia. She graduated at a time when the Bell Telephone companies were actively seeking engineers and recognized that they could greatly benefit from the talent emerging from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs).

Patrena excelled in her professional career, earning special recognition for designing and developing the nationally and "highly" acclaimed Access Training Program. This program effectively facilitated the understanding of technical aspects and concepts related to telecommunications networks for Regional Bell Operating Companies (RBOCs) and Bell Communications Research (Bellcore).

After retiring early to pursue her entrepreneurial ambitions, she created Professional Training and Consulting (PTC), a firm based in Charlotte, North Carolina, that focuses on enhancing job performance. Her engineering training classes were highly sought by leading communications and media organizations such as the Bells, Sprint, Walt Disney Productions, and IBM.

Patrena enjoys talking about one of her favorite topics, finance. So she created a 501C, Making Cents and Managing Money (MCAMM). This afforded opportunities to present various financial seminars to include managing/investing money, investment choices, spending personalities, etc. Through this venue, she was in a position to financially support and encourage many entrepreneurs in their venues. Patrena has been profiled in Fidelity Investment magazine.

To further pursue her paid traveling opportunities, Patrena accepted a technical training position with Lockheed Martin. This employment venue involved exclusive training for one of Lockheed Martin's client, The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) of Homeland Security. The assignment involved traveling throughout the US and Guam. After several years of traveling, Patrena decided to retire.

Patrena is an active member of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church in Charlotte, North Carolina, where she serves as a deacon and holds various leadership roles. She has a giving spirit, and in 2014 she was inducted in the Thomas E. Miller Society, and she is an active member of the Charlotte Alumni Chapter. Patrena loves to travel and enjoys sharing her experiences with family, friends, and everyone she encounters, as she says, "It's a joy!"

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNA AWARD Ms. Patricia Brown Lott, '63, '79

Patricia Brown Lott, a native of Orangeburg, is a retired educator with a distinguished thirty-seven-year career. She has held various roles, including teacher, guidance counselor, mathematics specialist, assistant principal, and principal. Her work experience spans several locations, including Charleston, South Carolina; Newburgh and Niagara Falls, New York; and Orangeburg Consolidated School Districts 5 and 3.

In 1963, Lott earned her bachelor's degree in mathematics education and a master's degree in counseling education in 1979, both from South Carolina State College (now university). She is a committed advocate and supporter of the institution and actively contributes to numerous initiatives and activities.

She is a life member of the South Carolina State University National Alumni Association (SCSUNAA) and its president from 2005-2009. Previously, she served four years as president of the Greater Orangeburg Alumni Chapter and continued serving in other positions after her elected position expired. She is an active member of Trinity United Methodist Church, Orangeburg, where she serves as a project manager for the church's grant writing team that has acquired three federal grants totaling \$500,000 each. Other recognized involvements include serving as financial secretary and treasurer for the Orangeburg Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated; as vice chairperson for the South Carolina State University (SCSU) Foundation; and as foundation gala chairperson for over five years. In April 2010, she was the first national alumni president elected by the South Carolina General Assembly to serve on the Board of Trustees at SCSU. In 2015, she was named the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) Basketball Tournament Distinguished Alumnus for her alma mater, in 2016, she served as the SCSU Homecoming Parade Marshal, and in 2019 she was inducted into the Thomas E. Miller Society.

Ms. Lott feels a deep sense of responsibility and obligation to give back to her alma mater, which has provided her with so much. As a member of the STATE Club, she is an enthusiastic season ticket holder for both football and basketball. She led an initiative to encourage the university to offer season tickets to fans sitting on the visitors' side of Oliver C. Dawson Stadium. As a result of her efforts, 500 people became season ticket holders in what was then "Section F."

Ms. Lott is the proud mother of two beautiful graduates of SC State: Wayne, who graduated in 1990 and served as the former president of the Columbia Alumni Chapter before he transitioned on July 27, 2021, and Valerie, who graduated in 1992 and is currently the president of the Raleigh-Durham Alumni Chapter. Wayne was married to Tanya Simmons, a 1998 graduate, and together they have two children, Halee and Blayne.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS AWARD Mr. Thomas L. Kennerly, '68, '74

Thomas L. "Jackie" Kennerly is like a diamond with many facets, each contributing to his unique glow and brilliance, comparable to the Hope Diamond. Although many people have known him for years, this biography will reveal aspects of his life that you may not know.

His name is permanently etched in the minds of many South Carolinians because of the 1968 Orangeburg Massacre on the campus of South Carolina State College (now university). He was among the twentyeight students shot while retreating from the South Carolina National Guard who opened fire on the unarmed students, gathered around a bonfire, on the front of the campus on February 8, 1968.

Jackie graduated from Wilkinson High School in the spring of 1964 and then enrolled at South Carolina State College (SCSC), where he played football as a wide receiver. After graduating in May 1968, he was drafted to play for the Cincinnati Bengals, but his football career was brief. Uncle Sam's draft board deemed him fit for service and sent him to Vietnam as an enlisted soldier in the United States Army. He later served in the Army Reserve and participated in the first Gulf War, Desert Storm/Desert Shield. His military service spanned more than thirty years.

In 1970, Jackie returned to his hometown of Orangeburg, South Carolina, where he continued his courtship and married his college sweetheart, Martha Cureton. His background in sports led to a coaching position at Orangeburg-Wilkinson High School. He completed his Master of Science degree in counseling and rehabilitation at his alma mater and was hired by the Orangeburg County Vocational Rehabilitation. In 1978, Jackie was promoted to a position at the South Carolina State Department of Vocational Rehabilitation and moved his family to Columbia, South Carolina. They became members of Second Calvary Baptist Church, where Jackie has served as a deacon for over thirty years. He is also the chairman of the Board of Christian Education, a member of the church choir, the Men's Chorus, and part of the "Brotherhood Club" (Men's Ministry). After retiring, he worked with the South Carolina Housing and Urban Development for a few years.

Jackie is very active in his community with Meals on Wheels and the South Carolina Election Board as a poll worker. He is a member of the South Carolina State University Columbia Alumni Chapter, a life member of the South Carolina State University National Alumni Association (SCSUNAA), a supporter of football and track, the S.T.A.T.E. Club, an inductee into the South Carolina State University Football Hall of Fame, a life member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), and a member of the American Legion and Sertoma International. Jackie and Mrs. Kennerly were inducees of the 2025 class of the Thomas E. Miller Society. He enjoys walking and exercising daily and having lunch with his Army buddies.

Thomas is a former member of his home church, The Historic Mt. Pisgah Baptist Church of Orangeburg. He and Martha have two adult children; Steven (Safiya) Kennerly and Angela (Arthdale) Brown, and three granddaughters: Alexis (Cedric), Layla, and Leah; one grandson: Jamale.

DISTINGUISHED YOUNG ALUMNA AWARD **DR. LAKEISHA JOHNSON, '06**

Dr. Lakeisha Johnson is an assistant professor in the Communication Science and Disorders program at Florida State University, and she is a certified speech-language pathologist. She is also the director of The Village, the community outreach and engagement division of the Florida Center for Reading Research.

A 2006 graduate of SC State University's Speech Pathology and Audiology program, Dr. Johnson received her doctorate in Communication Science and Disorders with an emphasis on literacy implications for culturally and linguistically diverse populations from Florida State University in 2012. Her primary research interests include language, literacy, dialect, and executive function development in African American children. Her mission is to investigate the areas above while building and strengthening research-practice partnerships between the university and the local community to ensure children from underserved populations obtain strong language and literacy skills.

In her free time, Dr. Johnson runs a website, Maya's Book Nook, to promote language and literacy skills using diverse children's books. She is an active member of the Chi Upsilon Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated, and several professional organizations related to communication disorders and literacy. Additionally, Dr. Johnson serves on the board for several community and literacy-based organizations, such as the Advisory Board of the Leon Public Library System, WFSU Public Media Community Council, Lexia Learning Educational Leadership Council, The Winward Institute Advisory Board, and Learning Ally National Advisory Board.

She is married to Bradford Johnson, a meteorologist and professor at Florida State University. They have three daughters, ages 19, 9, and 1.
